<p>IN-PERSON VOTING</p>	<p>Vote in person on Nov. 3. Make sure your vote counts!</p>			
<p>ABSENTEE VOTING (IN-PERSON)</p>	<p>From Sept. 22 to Nov. 2 at 4:30 p.m., visit your local election authority and complete an absentee application.</p>	<p>Receive your ballot and cast it at that time.</p>		
<p>ABSENTEE VOTING</p>	<p>Request in person, by mail, email or fax. Application must be received by local election authority no later than Oct. 21.</p>	<p>Receive ballot by mail and complete it promptly.</p>	<p>Have your ballot envelope notarized if necessary. (See below.)</p>	<p>Return ballot in person or by mail. Must be received by local election authority no later than 7 p.m. on Nov. 3.</p>

Application must be received by local election authority no later than Oct. 21.</p>	<p>Receive ballot by mail and complete it promptly.</p>	<p>Have your ballot envelope notarized.</p>	<p>Return ballot by U.S. Mail only. Must be received by local election authority no later than 7 p.m. on Nov. 3.</p>

DOES MY BALLOT NEED TO BE NOTARIZED?

ABSENTEE VOTING

Yes, if reason is:

- Religious beliefs or practice
- Working as an election worker
- Incarceration, if still eligible to vote
- Absence on Election Day from your election jurisdiction
- Certified participation in an address confidentiality program

No, if reason is:

- Incapacity or confinement due to illness
- Having contracted coronavirus or at-risk (in 2020) due to the following:
 - Age 65 or older
 - Living in a long term care facility
 - Chronic lung disease or moderate to severe asthma
 - Serious heart condition
 - Immunocompromised
 - Diabetes
 - Chronic kidney disease and undergoing dialysis
 - Liver disease
